



What are the Guidelines?

- · a tool for:
 - → planning
 - → management
 - → monitoring
- support <u>policy</u>, <u>legal</u>, <u>regulatory</u> and <u>technical</u> enabling



Why do we need them?

 balance between the institutional, economic, political, social, cultural and environmental aspirations;

to enhance <u>sustainable livelihoods</u> and <u>land use</u>.



The Scope

- Global, regional, local
- Support for the management chain:
 - → planning set up
 - → monitoring
 - → marketing
- Not legally binding



For whom?

- → Government policy, legal, regulatory and planning decision-makers
- → Investors (public or private, corporate or smallholder)
- → Forest managers



How were they prepared?

Through a multi-stakeholder process involving:

- → governments
- → intergovernmental organisations
- → private sector (corporate & smallholder)
- → NGO's (environmental & social)
- → scientific & academic institutions
